

Feel the heat. Hear the rumble. Something big's comin' to town! America's best loved Broadway musical will explode on the DGS stage this fall, full of flaming passions and melting romance.

Like multiple thunderbolts converging in the heavens, the creation of West Side Story was a spectacular on-stage convergence of America's greatest theatrical geniuses: composer Leonard Bernstein, choreographer-director Jerome Robbins, lyricist Stephen Sondheim, and librettist Arthur Laurents. No wonder this classic musical won 10 Academy Awards, three Tony Awards as a Broadway production, and numerous other artistic honors.

"West Side Story" is America's shorthand for Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet," the story of two star-crossed lovers caught in the cross-fire of hatred. But the modern setting is back-alley urban and utterly unurbane, a concrete jungle of twisted emotions and jagged repartee, of savage salvos and slicing switchblades.




The opening scene of "West Side Story" seeths with the stealthy savagery of two gangs—the Jets and the Sharks—and the stage sizzles for the rest of the evening.

The music is legend—from the achingly beautiful "Maria" to the slicked-back and smouldering "Cool," from the saucy "America" and smart-alecky "Gee, Officer Krupke!" to the tragic yearning of "One Hand, One Heart."

The dancing in "West Side Story" is just as dazzling. The cast of nearly 50 is simply breathtaking and the 16-piece live orchestra fills the auditorium with a magnificent score that soars one moment and plunges violently the next, taking the audience on a wild, emotional roller coaster of passions.



Their collaboration led to two Grammy Awards, television specials, gold records, and several "Best Male Singer" awards for Neville from Billboard and Rolling Stone. Later, the Neville Brothers would win a third Grammy for best instrumental pop recording.

The band includes Art on piano and organ, Cyrll on percussion and keyboards, and Charles on saxophone and flute, with all singing vocals. Their music brims with spiritual themes about love, hope, faith and respect for family, for humankind and for the earth. They are tough and tough-looking, but their songs are tender.

Experience the legendary Neville Brothers in concert and let their music fill you with tenderness and with triumph.





Dee Dee Bridgewater is Ella Fitzgerald incarnate. But she is far more than an Ella heir: she is Ella


Fitzgerald, Billy Holiday, Sarah Vaughn and Duke Ellington all rolled into one stunning persona.

This exuberant and exotic expatriate—Bridgewater was born in the U.S. but has long been based in Paris—has taken the States by storm recently winning two Grammy Awards in March 1998.

Dee Dee made her New York debut in 1970 as the lead vocalist with Thad Jones and Mel Lewis. Early in her career, she performed with such greats as Sonny Rollins, Dizzy Gillespie, Dexter Gordon, Stanley Clarke, and Ray Charles!

In 1974, her charismatic stage presence and spectacular, virtuoso voice in Broadway's "The Wiz" won her a Tony Award, and she garnered a coveted "Laurence Olivier Award" nomination for Best Actress for her portrayal of jazz legend Billy Holiday in "Lady Day."

Bridgewater can play sweet or sultry, tough or tender; she is a musical chameleon with high-voltage charisma and electrifying charm. She offers up a platter of sweet nostalgia: from Ella's luscious "My Heart

just laugh, you may just pop your buttons! Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo (The "Trocks." for short), are not only men in tights, but tutus and toeshoes as well! But to simply say that these hunky ballerinas with huge egos and humongous feet are humorous is an understatement. These dudes in drag are deliciously dopey!

The Trocks are not just jocks in frocks; their art is rich in tremendous athleticism, impeccable comedic timing, and clever references to ballet's greatest roles. Closer scrutiny of the dancers' names—Natasha Notgoudenoff, Fifi Barkova, Igor Slowpoken, and Karina Grudj, also known as the "Chernobyl Cherub," to name a few—show the Trocks are not above horsing around with Russian ballet's sacred warhorses.

Other dance forms do not escape the Trocks' irreverence. Audiences go wild over the Trocks' spirited doff-of-the-hat-then-kick-in-the-backside spoof of Riverdance, the dance world's most recent rage.

Then there are always their old standards, for example, Swan Lake's Dying Swan scene, dubbed "The Terminal Fowl," which—to say the least—is a foul deed, indeed!

The Trocks' burly burlesque consists of 14 exquisitely talented and tremendously athletic male dancers. Don't let their frumpy fouettees and awkward arabesques fool you; under their smeared lipstick and unruly headdresses, they are serious dancers as well.

One thing is certain: if laughter is the best medicine, the Trocks are a raucous Rx for whatever ails us.
